INTRODUCTION DVD FILMS

As a ministry, CVM is hugely excited to be producing this pack as part of the centenary commemorations of the First World War. The pack is designed for use on Remembrance Day and throughout the year in churches, men's groups, youth events, small groups and evangelistic guest meetings. It's designed to be a flexible resource which not only looks at the challenges of military life, but also points people to Jesus.

You will find exclusive testimonies on the DVD with some really honest and challenging content. Also included is a Gospel message filmed on location at the Menin Gate Memorial in Belgium where the Last Post is sounded every evening to express gratitude to those who gave their lives.

On our visit there, I was struck again by the massive loss of life. The Hall of Memory at the Gate contains the names of 54,896 unidentified Commonwealth soldiers. On completion it was discovered that it was too small to contain all the names, so another 34,984 were inscribed elsewhere... and that's just the unidentified soldiers... an estimated 16.5 million military and civilian deaths occurred during the conflict. 16.5 MILLION.

Our mission at CVM is to see men come to know Jesus and have their lives transformed. Many men will visit churches on Remembrance Day so we hope that this pack will help you to lead them to God from whom comes the promise of eternal peace and an end to war.

As ever, let us know how it goes so that we can keep producing what you need to connect men to the Gospel.
